HOLY COMMUNION FOR THE SICK: Please contact and arrange with Father if a sick call is needed. If anyone is in danger of death, please call Father **IMMEDIATELY!** for **Extreme Unction or Last Rites.**

CONFIRMATION: Will be conferred by Bishop Pivarunas upon request. Please let Father know of the need for youth or adults who may need, so as to begin preparation and to put in a request for a visit by Bishop Pivarunas.

HOLY ORDERS: Please see Father if a man feels a calling towards the priesthood and would like information or a woman feels called to the religious life.

DRESS CODE FOR CMRI CHAPELS

Out of respect for the Blessed Sacrament, and in keeping with Christian modesty, please observe the following standards of dress:

Women and girls—A suitable hat or veil should be used, that covers at least the crown of the head (I Cor. 11:5, 6, 10). No slacks, no sleeveless, revealing, or low-cut clothing (the Marylike Crusade's standard is that a dress be not cut more than two fingers' width below pit of throat). Dresses & skirts should cover knees when you are standing or sitting, and not have long slits in them. Strapless or spaghetti-strap clothing is always sinfully immodest and should never be worn. Please avoid "straight skirts" as well, since they are usually form-fitting and tight.

Men and boys—Suit coat and tie, dress slacks, or other formal attire. Jeans, shorts, "flip-flops," and other casual attire are inappropriate for church! Be sure to also avoid clothing with logos and/or large lettering, as these can be quite distracting. We welcome all our guests and visitors, and encourage you to read the blue pamphlet

"Welcome to the Traditional Latin Mass" (available in the vestibule). It explains why we must completely avoid the modern Mass and liturgies introduced since Vatican II.

ANYONE WHO ADHERES TO THE DOCTRINES OF FR. FEENEY IS BARRED FROM RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS IN THIS

CHAPEL. In the 1940's, Fr. Leonard Feeney S.J. promoted the heresy that there was no such thing as baptism of blood and baptism of desire. Fr. Feeney's teaching is contrary to the Universal Ordinary Magisterium of the Catholic Church. It was condemned in 1949 by the Holy Office. All Catholics are bound under pain of mortal sin to give assent to the teachings of the Holy Office. A number of lay people mistakenly adhere to this heresy, falsely thinking it is the teaching of the Catholic Church.

The Heart of the Mass published in 1936 Introduction: Mutual Relations of God and Man

Almighty God is, in Himself, eternal happiness; therefore nothing can be wanting to Him. Were something wanting to Him, He would no longer be God, in Whom all perfection dwells. And still there was a time when God called the wonderful universe into existence. Millions and millions of blessed spirits now surround Him in heaven. A host of suns and myriads of stars form, as it were, a triumphal way on which He treads. On our earth, the three kingdoms of nature: the animal, plant, and mineral kingdoms, of which He made man the king, proclaim His wisdom and power, His beauty and goodness.

Considering this, we involuntarily ask ourselves: For what reason did God (to whom nothing is wanting) create all this beauty, and call these many creatures into existence? Reason and faith answer: God did it out of purest love and goodness, out of Divine generosity. He did not wish to enjoy His bliss and happiness alone; He desired that other beings should share His glory and His riches. For this reason He created angels and men and called the universe into existence.

Man's Duty of Adoration: God is the Creator. Man, a creature, is the work of His hands, His possession. It is the duty of man *to consider the Creator as his supreme Lord and Master*, to prostrate in reverence and admiration before Him, to adore and praise Him.

To adore the Divinity, to pay homage to God – what an honor for a poor creature! To acknowledge in God all good, all truth, all that is worthy of affection; to submit one's understanding and will to God's greatness; to offer Him one's soul and body; yea, even to wish to consume oneself in order to procure Him honor and glory – can there be a nobler aim in life

God not only called the universe into being but He also preserves it continually. This constant preservation is no less a miracle than the creation itself. Were the Creator to withdraw His hand but for one instant from His work of creation, the great universe would return to nothingness; so too would every individual creature.

Hence, God thinks of us, His creatures, at every moment; He provides for us from day to day and preserves us with infinite love. He holds in store for us everything good, everything lovely and beautiful, for it is His glory to share His happiness; He wishes us to participate in it. He had made our earthly life like unto that of paradise; He places His whole creation at our feet. If we find thorns and thistles, it is not God's fault. Sin, willful sin, has spoiled His plans. The malice of original sin and of the many personal sins of mankind is the sole cause of our suffering and trials here below.

However, God, in His infinite mercy and goodness, has destined that these very sufferings and trials should become a source of merit and future happiness for us through His beloved Son. Jesus has ennobled and sanctified suffering through His Cross. Is it not just, then, that we should prove ourselves grateful for His Divine Providence, for the preservation of our life, for the many benefits He bestows upon us?

God's Right to Our Gratitude: God has a strict claim to the gratitude of His creatures. Gratitude should incessantly ascend to Him from the hearts of men, because God's providence is without limits, and God's love operates continually for us. Just as each moment of our life is a new benefit from God, so should it be a renewed thanksgiving toward our benevolent Creator. *Benefits demand gratitude*. Oh, that man would have the understanding and good will to think of his great Benefactor often during the day and the night – his life would become an uninterrupted hymn of thanks. But, alas! How different is the reality.

Instead of adoring his Lord and Creator and thanking Him, man offends Him fearlessly and impudently to His face. He sins every day! The helpless creature offends an almighty God! Sin is contempt of God, revolt against God, and compels the Creator to exercise His right to demand an account from the sinner, to punish him, and to refuse him pardon until he is sorry, does penance and makes satisfaction.
